Presidents' Report

Again I think we have been very productive for the community work we undertook during my second term of office, and that is solely because we have worked as a team and all pulled together, despite some Club members braking ankles, having hips and shoulders replaced or repaired , or other members having parts of one's anatomy attended to

WIND OF CHANGE

Borrowing part of a famous speech given in South Africa by the former UK Prime Minister, Harold MacMillan re what was happening in their country many years ago, the same in some aspects has taken or about to take place within our Club this Rotary Year. A wind of change is coming through.

Firstly, during this current Rotary Year the Board have been slowly progressing different aspects of a new proposed Constitution, and within that work we have also had legal advice from District's approved firm of Solicitors. The Board are now ready to present the Constitution to you for discussion and vote on the first meeting after tonight's Changeover when Justin will be the President.

The other major change regarding our Club is that we have had to change our official venue from the SS & A Club to The Albury Club. The reasons for this were basically purely financial. The SS&A were wanting to greatly increase the cost of our Wednesday meals, which would have meant, amongst other things, that our revenue for 'Community Club' projects would have been seriously eroded. The cost of an official function, e.g. Changeover Night the costs would also have been drastically increased. After careful consideration and visits, the Board of Directors decided to accept an offer from The Albury Club to hold our meetings there, and all I have heard since we moved have been praise for the quality of food, the general service and cleanliness, the aesthetics of the building, and the facility to have a quiet soft drink etc before the meal and whilst networking amongst ourselves. Also it will be nice to sit within the gardens of the club during summer and have a BBQ as the meal for the meet.

<u>BBQ's</u>

We performed our usual commitments in regard to Harvey Norman and Christmas Carols, RSPCA Paws Walk, and a tour of BBQ duty at Bunnings, Albury. We were also approached to do again BBQ duties at the inaugural launch of the Fight Type 1 Diabetes

Walk, and another animal BBQ at Hovell Tree Park. We even manned the BBQ for a recent Vintage Car Club whereby we provided breakfast for the crews before they visited other parts of NE Victoria.

As is known we pass on all profits to the RSPCA re Paws Walk, and the Diabetes Walk. This year RSPCA **received** approximately **\$900 towards the wonderful work they do**, and the Type 1 Diabetes Foundation received **just over \$400** for their organisation. Hopefully we will be invited to work for them again next year when Justin will be at the helm.

A possible addition re fundraising next year will be hopefully manning a BBQ for a couple of days at the Bravehearts Regatta on the Lake at Lincoln Causeway. If that comes about then we will share profits with them at a rate yet to be agreed.

Charity Dinners

Within the current year of office, we held a charity fundraising raising dinner with local matching wines for the new opening of the Parent and Baby Unit at Wodonga Hospital, and which was this years Partner of the DG project. The dinner was again held at La Maison and wine, was supplied by Wendy Killeen of Stanton and Killeen fame. Ms. Julie Wright, A/Director of the AWHA Maternity and Parent and baby Unit spoke at the Dinner advising just how important this kind of service facility is for Mothers who have just given birth and how they can assist both mothers and babies for up to 12 months post birth. The dinner and wine sale **raised slightly under \$1000** for the Unit.

Community Services.

The Club performed many numerous Community Services this year. We performed our annual Christmas Food and Easter 'Shut – in' projects for those less fortunate than ourselves and delivered various food bags to persons within Albury. Thanks here are also due to Nicole Doughty and Dennis Martin who stepped in at very very short notice and completed the initial work Julie had started whilst she was still recovering from breaking her ankle/leg. and was taking a mix of rehab and holiday.

Following a suggestion from Dennis Martin when doing some gardening and clearing for a site at Padman Drive, Dennis came up with the wonderful suggestion of approaching Council to see if we could create a form of Monument with individual plaques naming past Rotarians who have gone to higher places. Dennis and I have met with some senior officers of Albury City Council who are assisting us with possibly better locations, and discussions are continuing.

International

Whilst it was a first for our Club in that we are successfully completing in an International project with the refurbishment of the Kitende School rooms in Tanzania. The Club is currently doing all of this financing on its own and with the private financial assistance of individual sponsors, including one person who matches anything we can obtain as Club

contributions. A wonderful gesture which the Club greatly appreciates. The project has been highly successful with not only the schoolchildren having the services of a regular teacher, but also they receive two nourishing meals per day. Additionally the jungle drums have conveyed what has happened at Kitende to surrounding Massai villages, and school numbers have significantly increased, despite some of these children and parents from an outlying area having to walk them to and from school because their route could have wildlife dangers. This project came about through the enthusiasm and persistence of Debra and Howard Hinde, who is also our current International Director. Both of them visited the school this Rotary year and came back smiling at seeing how successful it is turning out to be. As stated the project has so far exceeded expectations and we are now investigating ways in which we may get a District Grant in 2014 and provide a separate area for shower and accommodation for visiting International guests to stay if they are visiting the area. Also the new works will separate the toilet facility from the kitchen and thereby greatly reduce the risk of germs being passed on through food contamination. At the time of writing we are yet to hear whether we have been successful in gaining a District grant, fingers crossed for a positive outcome.

Howard has advised that he will be standing down from Directorships for Rotary Year 2014/15, and on behalf of the Club, I would personally like to publicly thank him for all his help, assistance and advice on this project and sometimes mentoring on being a President and what to include or exclude within a diplomatic framework for certain letters etc, or what to possibly say.!! I'm greatly indebted to you Howard for all your input these past couple of years.

Vocational Service

The year the Vocational Director was in the shape of Dan Sawyer, and ignoring the fact that he is a Kiwi, he has again done a wonderful job in the position with the various responsibilities this post entail and had to unexpectedly refill the position after Vicki Grey had to leave the Club for personal and business reasons. His enthusiasm is very infectious and his ideas are always worth consideration. One of Dan's suggestions from the previous Rotary year which the Club adopted is the bringing in recently disused magazines from members, friends or Surgeries etc and redistributed to local under financed residents to read and review whereas otherwise they would not be afford them. Dan advises that the project is going very well and feel sure he will be writing about it in his report. Assisting Dan in this portfolio has been the skill and equal enthusiasm of Roger Beardwell who will be re-joining the Board again for next year.

Club Projects

Managed in his usual efficient way by Roger Lescun. Roger is still working on a possible major club project re a Community Walk over toward the eastern side of Albury. Also Roger and the Club is deeply involved in the Midnight Basketball project and he and Rod Bramich make a formidable pair in getting responses from various organisations. There

are many within the Club who assist in some way during the season, and again I am very indebted to you all for all your 'Friday' night time you devote to the project.

Through Roger's efforts, we are still trying to seek a suitable course to enable us to further fundraise Club finances by the running of a half and possibly later on a full marathon within the borders of Albury and Wodonga. Talks with various interested groups and may all come to fruition during Justin's period of office.

We have been able to obtain a wide range of Speakers for our Club meetings and all have been very interesting talking about their respective fields of work. It cannot be easy always trying to find somebody, but Roger always rose to the occasion and found someone.

Whilst Roger will not be on next year's Board, I would again like to publicly thank him for all the hard work and assistance he has offered to both myself and the Board over the past two years of my Presidency. Though I sometimes 'huffed and puffed' I have been very much appreciative of your invaluable guidance and assistance as a Board member. Roger, in many ways you have been our Legal Beagle when researching something for Directors / Club information from the archives and that is very much appreciated.

<u>Treasurer</u>

This is Dennis's second year in the position and again I think the Club has been exceptionally lucky in finding a person with his skills, energy and discretion for anything to do with the Club. Again I have been so lucky in that all of our Directors are so good in their respective roles, and Dennis has again done some great work re club finances this year and getting to grips with various financial matters and introducing some different systems. Dennis thankyou also for being a great chauffeur for me when I was unable at times to drive this current year – for Orthopaedic reasons I hasten to add.

Secretary

As I stated in last years report I would have been lost without Justin this past year. Considering he operates a local flourishing veterinary business, is the President of the local Rugby Union club, and a Dad of two little-uns, he performs his Secretarial duties so well. Never late with applications and distributions, copies of Minutes from our meetings and usually distributed within hours of the meeting finishing , as well as being a translator of some of my hurried messages, his work rate has been phenominal . I suppose Tabatha does see something of him...... occasionally. The Club are so lucky to have him and for 2014-2015 he will be our Clubs President.

I have not the slightest shadow of a doubt he will be an absolutely brilliant President for us and will very definitely lead from the front. I have seen for myself that he has been working on various Club matters and ideas and will hit the ground running from 1st July.

<u>Membership</u>

A person of many talents is our Gordon. Besides interviewing prospective members, he gave great assistance to the Club in either assisting to more official luncheons, designing various advertising designs. Plus other work as and when required. Last year Club 'home' project

As already advised the Board agreed to combine in a project with the Maternity Unity of Albury Wodonga Health in assisting them in raising funds to create a type of Ronald McDonald house in their proposed new Maternity Care Unit where they will be taking on the work previously done by the Baby Unit of Mercy Hospital and provide individual expert advice through specialist nurses, paediatricians, also mental health facilities. The Unit will basically assist new born babes with feeding difficulties, and sleeping problems etc. We had a special club committee to assist them in fundraising etc and report back to the club. Taking into account the workloads of our other Directors, the committee consisted of Gordon Shaw, Vicky Gray, and myself. Unfortunately Vickki had to leave the project but not before she had done some great groundwork.

In conjunction with the Unit we had arranged a fundraising dinner at La Maison, and we were going to supplement that with two Trivia nights, which unfortunately were both cancelled at the last minute through general lack of numbers, and which appeared to come about because we were following on from other Clubs Trivia nights being held just a few weeks previously.

Miscellaneous

To all members of the Board, I thank you most sincerely for all the effort and professionalism you have given me this past year. I really appreciate all the help and assistance given, so thank you all once again.

I would also like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank the other club members who have done tremendous club work 'behind the scenes'. Members such as Paul Armstrong – the roster guru-, and now handed over to Darrin Halcrow, Ron Haberfield and Ian Harrison, and Peter Merk – editors and producers of the weekly Club Bulletin or this end of year report booklet. Our various Sergeant at Arms for the finding of reasons, usually totally fictitious to otherwise justifiably 'fine' members for their alleged misdemeanours. To Graham Fuller, Dennis Hickey, Paul Armstrong and any other member who has lugged the BBQ trailer around the city. Terry Simmons for all the ordering of the sausages etc wanted for the BBQ, and maintaining our excellent website. To Ian Harrison and Dennis Martin for getting Club insignia ready and stored away at our meetings. Also a big thank you to all members who stepped in at very short notice to fill an unforeseen vacancy. Barry Young for still being the Clubs leading Tenor and great work done as the Welfare Officer, and making River of Stories such an iconic competition now within local senior schools. To likes of Dan and Graham Maddox re their Creative Accounting skills re the weekly Attendance Figures. To Julie for battling on with various Club projects whilst relaxing on her backside doing her rehab. A really big thank you to you all. Though I've mentioned Ron Haberfield, I also include Barbara Haberfield for a 'special' thankyou in the opening of their house for our various Fellowship get – togethers, and more recently in the entertaining of our fellow Rotarians from Thailand, plus the ladies of Inner Wheel who insisted on doing the clearing up so us menfolk could carry on entertaining our guests.

Also congratulations to our Club members who attended the new style Rotary Leadership Courses held over the past year at Euroa. The course is really enjoyable with many opportunities for networking and understanding in much greater depth the work of Rotary. A truly worthwhile course for any club member wishing to progress further within the Club and Rotary movement

As is known during my previous Presidential Rotary year, we lost Hodgey as he went to 'higher places'. I am delighted to mention that during this Rotary year he was posthumously awarded the AOM for all his endeavours for the different community groups he served so well in previous years. Congratulations Phyllis and family in having such a wonderful man.

My unexpected two year period as your President has now drawn to a close, and from it one always learns. One learns about the depth of feeling members have for their club, the espirit de corp which prevails throughout it. The depth of feeling one has for a member who might not be enjoying the greatest of health. The really wonderful Board of Directors I have had to work with these past two years.

When I initially took on the role of President, one of my aims was to bring in a younger Board, and I think that has now been achieved with those who are remaining and accepted Director positions to serve Justin and following that with Gordon being the then President Elect. KITENDEN PROJECT

This year our Club continued the project to organize the funding of the Preschool in the Tanzanian Village of Kitenden. Kitenden is a Maasai village situated at the foot of Mt. Kilimanjaro. Through this project the Preschool building was renovated late in 2012 and reopened in February 2013.

The Preschool is a vital first stage for the education of Maasai children. The Maasai language is Maa, verbal but not written. The national language in Tanzania is Kiswahili, and unless the Maasai children are taught Kiswahili they face enormous difficulty with further education. The children are also taught numeracy skills and basic English.

The children are feed two nourishing meals each day, which in many cases is an incentive for parents to take them to school. The preschool children can be required to walk many kilometers to attend school and as they are very young they require an escort. Each child brings a piece of wood each day for the cooks to use in their cooking fire.

In the 2013 year the preschool had an average of 53 children enrolled. They are aged from 3 to 5 years.

40 children graduated from the 2013 preschool class and are now attending Primary School. We all should be very proud that our support has contributed to this achievement.

The 2013 expenditure was within the budget of \$12,300. This budget funds the wages for the Preschool staff, consisting of two teachers, two cooks, a gardener and a security guard. It also funds the food for the children's meals, classroom requirements and building repairs.

This year there are 50 or so children enrolled – enrollments vary according to parental circumstances. This number includes the 13 younger children who attended the Preschool last year but who were too young to progress to Primary School.

There is a plan to construct an additional building to house the kitchen area and separate it from its current location joined to the toilet block. This new building will accommodate visiting volunteers who will assist in the educational process, village activities and perhaps

building maintenance. The cost of this building will be in the order of \$8000 and we will be applying for a Rotary Foundation District grant to support this construction.

The Kitenden project is undertaken and managed through Future Warriors Project Inc – a registered Australian charity, based in Brisbane and headed by Sianga Kuyan and his Australian wife Melanie.

ROTARY FRIENDSHIP EXCHANGE

During May this year our Club hosted 10 Rotarians from District 2360 in Thailand. They arrived on Monday May 19th and departed on Thursday May 22nd.

Their program was meticulously and dare I say – very enthusiastically - organized by Roger and Judy Snell. The visitors were accommodated by 9 of our members and their families. Our visitors were greeted at Albury airport on the Monday by many of our members. Then on Tuesday Roger and Judy took them on a full day tour of the Beechworth and Bright area, followed that evening attending the Rotary Club of Albury North meeting, where they gave an extensive presentation. They attended our Club lunch meeting on Wednesday and that afternoon visited the Albury Library for an Indigenous welcome, visited St Mathews Church and the Commercial Club. That evening Ron and Barbara Haberfield generously opened their home for the evening meal with about 40 members, guests and our visitors present.

On Thursday morning the group travelled to Benalla for the changeover to their hosts the Rotary Club of Yea. They will then visit Tatura before going to Sydney for the International Conference.

PHILIPPINES DISASTER

We contributed \$500 to the Rotary Club of Banilad Metro to assist in relief for the cyclone disaster in the Philippines last year.



We have completed our 4th year of Midnight Basketball in Albury. The program commenced in Albury mostly due the support and commitment of Rotary and our club, but also Albury City, the PCYC and Kalianna.

Midnight Basketball Australia provide a significant cash contribution to local tournaments usually on the basis of a 2 year commitment by the community. We have now completed our 2nd 2 year commitment and for Midnight Basketball to return to Albury we must apply for another 2 year commitment. I know that Midnight Basketball Australia are supportive of the program continuing in Albury, but before they can consider our application we will need to demonstrate the community remains supportive and we have the basics in place (i.e. committee, volunteers, participants, logistics and financial). To gauge community support and provide an update on the program we held a community meeting on 25th June. Subject to sufficient community support and approval by Midnight Basketball Australia, it is proposed to hold our next tournament in term 4 2014 (i.e. October to December).

The program has been very successful and the kids are keen for it to return. It provides great benefit to the kids involved but also the many volunteers find it rewarding and fulfilling.

Secondary School Writing and Poetry Competition

To compliment Rotary International's quest to eradicate illiteracy worldwide the Albury Hume Rotary Club became aware of kids not reading and writing due to their addiction to computer games, internet, text messages etc.

The Rotary Club of Albury-Hume visited all Secondary schools and after meeting with school principals and English masters it was decided to aim the project at year 7 & 8 year Secondary school students (now also yr 9 & 10) and for them to participate in the writing competition (now also Poetry) and attend workshops at all schools conducted by professional children authors.

The objective of the project:

1 - To provide a positive opportunity for young school students to enhance their literacy learning and skills and the underlining of the importance of literacy in our community.

2 - The encouragement of inspiring of literary creativity underpinning the celebration of our regional literary talent.

Benefit to the community

The encouragement of school children and students to express in writing, their pride in our regional and multicultural heritage thus strengthening the development of literacy through creative writing.

The encouragement of inspiring of literary creativity

The objective to assist young people to develop and increase their literacy skills.

The celebration of regional literary talent.

Description of Project

Brief history

In 2003 the Rotary Club of Albury Hume initiated a writing competition for year 7 & 8 students of Albury and Wodonga Secondary Schools. This was to compliment International Rotary's quest to endeavour to wipe out illiteracy worldwide.

The initiative also complimented the concern of Federal and State Governments in respect of children not reading and writing due to the popularity of email, internet, text messages, internet games etc.

The competition took the form of a short story of not more than 1500 words.

In 2003 - 10 Albury-Wodonga secondary schools were approached and 6 participated.

The prizes were -

Each individual winner from their respective school to receive a \$50 book voucher on Dymocks. The outright winner - \$250 cash funded by Rotary and the winning school -\$750 towards their Library funded by Rotary.

78 entries were received and were judged by a professional panel.

The outright winner came from Wodonga High School and Wodonga High School received \$750 towards their library.

In 2004 - 12 schools came on board and 97 entries were received.

The winner was from Scots School – Albury.

As an additional initiative two visiting authors were invited who carried out workshops at the Wodonga, Albury and Lavington Libraries.

The workshops were extremely well supported by all schools as the cost is normally out of the reach of most schools. All prizes were presented at a Family Day in conjunction with the Albury Library

2005 saw 13 schools come on board with 147 entries and the first prize was shared by Wodonga West High School and Scots School, Albury. The winning students received \$125 each and the schools \$375 each towards their library. Approx 500 students attended the workshops conducted by the two visiting authors now an important feature of the competition but very costly. Due to the number of students participating the authors conducted the workshops not only at the libraries but also at the schools.

The Principals and English Departments of all schools are high in praise of the project and support the competition with great enthusiasm.

2006 – saw 13 schools participating – 278 entries were received - 6 Wodonga Secondary schools and 8 Albury schools plus St Paul's from Walla Walla and Billabong High school from Culcairn.

The workshops an important part of the competition was extended to three days due to the number of students participating. These were held at the Albury, Lavington and Wodonga Libraries and selected schools because of volume of participants.

2007 saw 14 schools participate this year with the added section of poetry and the competition expanded to include year 9 &10.

378 short Story and 78 poetry entries were received. Michael Pryor a noted children's Author conducted workshops at Albury and Wodonga libraries.

2008 - !4 schools participated and once again year 9 & 10 were included plus the poetry section.

Outstanding author and illustrator Mandy Ord has been be invited to conduct workshops at the Albury and Wodonga libraries where over 500 students attended

The competition was launched during the "Write Around The Murray Festival" and concluded in conjunction with The Albury City Library and Museum at a family fun and prize giving day during "Children's Week" on Saturday 18th October.

.A record 530 entries were received and judged

Our thanks to Jill Aplin and Peter Cerexhe who judged the poetry section and to John McDonald who joined them to judge the short Story section.

2009

16 secondary schools were invited and 14 schools participated – 7 from Albury – 6 from Wodonga

Nearly 600 entries were received. A writing workshop was held by author Robyn Young. .

The prizes were presented to the winning students and winning schools at the Albury Library Museum.

2010

14 schools took part with 7 from Albury and 6 from Wodonga. 625 entries were received. The workshop was well attended. The family fun day and prize giving held at the Albury Library museum was a great success with all winners being in attendance and school principles and English teachers from Albury and Wodonga schools.

2011

14 schools took part and over 600 entries were received . A further 300 students attended the workshops. The prize giving day held at the Albury Library Museum was attended by a

winning students, teachers, school principals and teachers, family members and the media.

2012

14 schools participated - 600 entries - Prizes to students – including individual school winners short story and poetry sections – outright school winners short story and Poetry sections – prizes to winning school libraries

2013

13 schools participated with 32 prizes awarded to Students and Schools. The workshops were extremely well attended. A wonderful attendance at the Prize Giving Day held at the Albury Library Museum.

2014

The project is well under way and grants from the Albury City Council and The Commercial Club total \$3000.

Budget to cover prize money and workshops = \$6000.

Albury-Hume Club Member's Contribution.

Liaison with schools, appointment of judging panel, arranging visiting author, administration costs (printing, tel, mail, email etc) - travelling to schools costs - raising money for prizes through 22 sausage sizzles, participation in Family fun and prize giving day.

The River of Stories is in its 12th year and still growing.
